	The post rotates between the liver surgery and liver medicine and has the following educational opportunities:

Supervisor(s) for the placement	Over the period of your placement, you will be working with a number of Consultants all of whom can provide clinical supervision during the time you are on duty with them. However, you will be assigned a specific named Clinical supervisor for the placement and a named Educational Supervisor for the year.
Main duties of the placement	<ul> <li>Management of liver transplant patients from assessment through transplantation to post transplant care</li> <li>Management of immunosuppressant drugs</li> <li>Management of acute or chronic liver dysfunction or failure</li> <li>Management of acute variceal bleeding</li> <li>Pre-operative and Post-operative management of hepato-biliary cancer</li> <li>Management of acute cholecystitis and biliary colic</li> <li>Ascitic tap or drainage</li> </ul>
