Placement	FY1 Trauma & Orthopaedics
The department	 QEHB has a record of excellence in treating trauma, as a regional centre for major trauma and the primary receiving hospital for all of Britain's serious military casualties. The department offers the opportunity to work in a multidisciplinary, civilian and military team at the very forefront of trauma and orthopaedic surgery. The new National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) Centre for Surgical Reconstruction and Microbiology has been established at the hospital. The total investment of £20 million will be used to help bring military and civilian trauma surgeons and scientists together to share innovation in medical research and advanced clinical practice in the battlefield, benefiting all trauma patients in the NHS at an early stage of injury.

Supervisor(s) for the placement	Over the period of your placement, you will be working with a number of Consultants all of whom can provide clinical supervision during the time you are on duty with them. However, you will be assigned a specific named Clinical supervisor for the placement and a named Educational Supervisor for the year.
Main duties of the placement	 Daily ward rounds, sometimes self-led Ensuring patients are ready pre-operatively and reviewing post-operatively Reviewing acutely ill patients with both medical and surgical issues

Typical working pattern in this placement	Typical working patterns include patient care on the wards. You are not part of the trauma team. However, when on call, you are welcome to attend, if you are not held up elsewhere.
