The department	The Vascular Surgery team treat all vascular conditions and work closely with several departments in the management of complex oncological, thoracic and paediatric cases. Management of acute and chronic lower limb ischaemia Carotid endarterectomy Open and endovascular aneurysm repair Angioplasty Lower limb bypass Varicose veins treatment including endovenous laser surgery Diabetic foot service Collaborative service for treatment of Melanoma, Sarcoma and head and neck cancer Paediatric vascular disease Vascular trauma
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	 Routine care of vascular in-patients with associated specialties e.g. cardiology, diabetes, nephrology, stroke care and rehabilitation. All routine ward based procedures including management of epidurals, chest drains and complex wounds. Vascular outpatient and pre-assessment clinics. Opportunities to attend theatre and undertake basic surgical procedures. Consultant and registrar ward rounds. Weekly ward MDT for nursing, physiotherapy, OT, district nursing and social services. Weekly vascular clinical and MDT x-ray meeting Audit project, which may be incorporated into research audit or project. Supervisor(s) for the placement	Over the period of your placement, you will be working with a number of Consultants all of whom can provide clinical supervision during the time you are on duty with them. However, you will be assigned a specific named Clinical supervisor for the placement and a named Educational Supervisor for the year.

Main duties of the placement	 Registrar and consultant-led ward rounds; up-to- date knowledge of patients required. Phlebotomy; especially from central lines. Discharge summaries. Pre-admissions clinic. Arranging investigations, especially with interventional radiologists. Liaising with microbiology.
