The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	 General practice surgeries Seeing patients and managing/treating them independently but under supervision (this may include home visits on the duty day); opportunity to sit in to observe the management of chronic disease e.g. hypertension, diabetes, COPD, asthma, CKD; observe midwife antenatal checks, Health Visitor developmental checks, baby check; observe minor surgery, fitting of coils and insertion/removal of contraceptive implant; learn to do joint injections; opportunity to be involved in teaching medical students during term times. If any particular interest in commissioning, there are opportunities to attend meetings with one of the other GPs or practice manager. Sitting with other Practice staff both clinical and non-clinical Regular one-to-one tutorials with clinical supervisor to update e-portfolio, and feedback on consultations etc. Teaching on QOF Practice base audit Monthly medical meetings Weekly protected F2 Teaching

Supervisor(s) for the placement	You will be assigned a specific named Clinical supervisor for the placement and a named Educational Supervisor for the year.
Main duties of the placement	To see how General Practice works and how business is run. Involvement in day to day Surgery work Home visits (on duty day)
Typical working pattern in this placement	Morning and afternoon sessions seeing patients: initially 30 minute consultations that reduce to 20 minutes, then to 15 minutes when competency and confidence allows. Home visits. Protected study time for e-portfolio and audit work etc.
