Placement	FY2 Geriatric Medicine
The department	In the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham, Geriatric Medicine has 110 beds organised across 4 specialist geriatric medicine wards, including acute geriatrics, Orthogeriatrics and stroke. There are 11 Consultant Geriatricians with specific responsibility for a team or ward.

Supervisor(s) for the placement	Over the period of your placement, you will be working with a number of Consultants all of whom can provide clinical supervision during the time you are on duty with them. However, you will be assigned a specific named Clinical supervisor for the placement and a named Educational Supervisor for the year.
Main duties of the placement	 Care of 12-18 elderly medical inpatients Responsible for ward duties, 2 consultant ward rounds a week, otherwise independent ward round, with support from specialty registrars. On calls on CDU clerking acute admission, and out-of-hours ward cover Contributing to geriatric MDT once weekly Clerking new patients onto the ward and formulating management plans Organising relevant investigations such as imaging and blood tests, then acting on this information Collecting collateral histories including functional history and social
