Placement	FY2 Medical Oncology
The department	The Oncology Department has a major in-patient and day case commitment with beds on 3 wards in the new QE Hospital including a specifically desgined and equipped Young Persons Unit and a day case chemotherapy unit
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	The post offers broad experience in the management of cancer and its complications as well as experience of curative and palliative chemotherapy and radiotherapy treatments. The post holder will work alongside a team of Consultants, across different Oncological specialities as well as work closely with allied specialities such as palliative care in a supportive and well supervised ward environment. There are opportunities to observe out-patient oncology. 	In addition there is a monthly oncology ward doctor's forum with one of the oncology consultants, which reports to the education lead for the division which aims to pick up concerns early and address them so that training and learning environment is maintained.
Where the placement is based	University Hospital Birmingham NHS Foundation Trust
Supervisor(s) for the placement	Over the period of your placement, you will be working with a number of Consultants all of whom can provide clinical supervision during the time you are on duty with them. However, you will be assigned a specific named Clinical supervisor for the placement and a named Educational Supervisor for the year.



Main duties of the	You will be based on the Oncology wards within the new QEHB.
placement	The inpatients comprise a mixture of acute and chronic oncological problems such as spinal cord compression, neutropenic sepsis and routine treatments such as inpatient chemotherapy. In addition, there will be many patients with more chronic palliative needs and you will need to work both with the Oncology and Palliative Care teams in the hospital as well as community based support services. • Clerking patients for elective chemotherapy - checking bloods, that patient is well, pre-chemo drugs and post chemo drugs prescribed. • Clerking new patients with complications from cancer or chemotherapy i.e. neutropenic sepsis, spinal cord compression, end of life care, symptom control. • Regular Consultant led ward rounds and follow up from these. • Review patients admitted for day case chemo/treatment i.e. blood results / patient too ill to continue/start treatment • General oncology ward duties -blood forms, TTOs, speak to family members, arrange/prepare for end of life/referral to hospices
Typical working pattern in this	The oncology ward doctors are organised into teams who between them cover the necessary 24 hour shift pattern needed. Duties are allocated on a daily basis
placement	at a morning handover.
	There is a registrar on the ward each week who attends handover and who will then help with assessment of unwell patients needing urgent senior review of particularly pressing problems. In addition, you will interact with a range of oncology consultants via their weekly ward rounds plus on an as-needs basis driven by clinical considerations. In addition to this there is an on call Consultant, who attends the ward daily to support the ward registrar and juniors.
