Individual Placement Description – The Dudley Group NHS Foundation Trust

Placement	FY2 Intensive Care Medicine
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The department	Intensive Care Medicine. The Medical High Dependency Unit (MHDU) is located on the second floor in the West Wing.
	The Unit cares for severely unwell medical patients requiring (level 2 care) closer observation than a general ward can deliver and offers specialist support for patients experiencing organ failure while providing continuous monitoring of our patients. Respiratory support measures include the use of high flow oxygen and non-invasive ventilation (NIV). Cardiac and blood pressure support is provided by the continuous infusion of drugs that is guided by the use of monitoring devices such as arterial and central lines.
	In addition, acute dialysis is also provided.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	Daily ward rounds start at 9.15 am. Trainess can join in EAU handover of sick patients on MHDU and medical wards overnight at 9am. In addition, an opportunity to attend ITU ward rounds on Tuesday mornings will be arranged if possible.
	Experience includes requesting investigations and liaising with specialist teams in management of patients eg, renal and gastroenterology teams.
	 Procedures will include: central lines (using ultrasound) arterial line insertion to be done under supervision unless signed off competent.
	FY2s carry the MHDU bleep, facilitating the transfer of sick patients on medical wards to MHDU and assist MDU staff in setting up non-invasive ventilation (NIV) in EAU prior to transfer to MHDU if needed.
	Daily handover of patients on MHDU to medical registrar on call takes place at 5 pm (handover sheet).
	Teaching will take place during daily ward rounds with the consultants plus there is a protected teaching programme of 3 hours per week and ITU bedside teaching.

Main duties of the placement	 All ward rounds should have the following documentation: date, time, name of doctor leading ward round, problem list and day of MHDU admission, A-airway, B-breathing, c-circulation, D-E, temp/CRP/WCC/antibiotics. When started and recent imaging and Plan. Some patients will need reviews more frequently and changes in condition during the day should be documented – there will be a brief afternoon ward round around 3 – 4 pm. Communication with patient's relatives daily at 2 pm in the afternoon. Investigations to be requested promptly and may need to be discussed with radiologist of the day. All patients should have a discharge summary prior to moving out of the unit and include, primary diagnosis, length of stay, key investigations and plan on discharge. The FY2 should call the respective ward to handover the patient to their counterpart eg FY2/CMT covering the ward the patient is going to.
